Summer is the quietest time in the church building - people are away, very few regular rental groups are meeting, winter programs are on a summer hiatus. The COVID-19 pandemic has been like an extended summer in the building, as restrictions have limited even the meetings that we regularly are able to hold. *But, a LOT has been happening "behind the scenes*":

Our wonderful librarian, Lynn Wyvill, has been updating the library selections, and communicating with everyone weekly to highlight books and DVDs that everyone is welcome to borrow to pass the time at home. She even set up a delivery program!

The Annesley Quilters have been completing quilts at home, and have been providing quilts as needed in the community. At the beginning of the pandemic, when people were first trying to find masks, Nancy Edwards sewed many, many wonderful masks in two sizes, and made them available to all.

The Prayer Shawl program has been in full swing. Some of our expert Knit Wits have taken wool home to knit the beautiful and cozy shawls that are distributed to comfort people in the congregation and the community. People have been great to communicate the need for shawls to Jean Benninger, which is difficult to do when we don't meet each week.

Dedicated members of the Garden Club have been trimming, weeding and watering the beautiful gardens around Annesley. Theirs is a "socially distanced" activity, and they have kept the grounds looking lovely.

Dale Beare has kept the FundScrip program going, with an order each month. FundScrip is one of the few fundraising methods that we have been able to keep up this past 17 months. Thanks to the regular group of people who have ordered each month, FundScrip has provided **thousands** of dollars in revenue to Annesley since Dale started it a few years ago. If you have not discovered the benefits of this program, give it a try!

A replacement for the annual Pork Chop BBQ, the Harriston Packing Co. meat fundraiser was a great success. Thank you to all who ordered, helped organize, and on delivery day. *See more in this Newsletter*.

Centering Prayer have continued to meet in their own homes, and have brightened the spirits of the community by providing 4 lunches to the staff at Centre Grey Hospital and Grey Gables. They also helped the Easter Bunny by providing treats and Easter blessings to many people. What a great idea!

The caring and dedicated people on the Pastoral Care Team, Jill Lawford, John Lewis and Heather Spry, have been amazing over the past 17 months, and before that, with the absence of a minister. People have needed extra care during this time for many reasons, and they have been there for them. (Cont'd)

The Search Team have continued to meet, have updated our listings and have followed up every possible lead to attempt to find a minister for Annesley. This is a very difficult task, as over 200 Pastoral Charges are looking for ministers. *More details later in this Newsletter*.

The Property Committee and the custodian have kept the building and the furnace in good shape. For all of that necessary hand washing, we now have hands-free faucets and new wheelchair friendly sinks in the upstairs washrooms.

Another group of people have put much time and effort into updating Annesley's website (markdaleunited.ca) over the last few months. You can now go on the website to watch services, find links to books and their authors in our library, view and print Annual Reports, read weekly news and newsletters, print FundScrip forms or forms for other fundraisers as they happen. Or, you can just go there to see some wonderful photos of Annesley United Church!

The Annesley Trustees work hard every year to make sure that the Insurance coverage meets our needs, and this year they worked on an idea that was introduced at the Annual Meeting in February of 2020: to combine the various cemetery boards. *This will be presented at the Annual Meeting on July 14th.* 

We are thankful for everyone who has continued to support Annesley through PAR and envelopes in the mail and over the counter. Many of the regular expenses have continued throughout the pandemic, and that support has kept us afloat.

Last but not least, a very dedicated and hardworking group have provided a beautiful service each week since March of 2020, so that the congregation (and beyond) can have some of their spiritual needs met through a church service from Annesley. Countless hours are spent each week to prepare the service that is shown on YouTube, and it has been viewed each week by a far greater number than attend services when they are in the building. (*The Christmas Eve Service has been viewed almost 800 times!*) The goal is to continue to have a service for the people who will not be able to attend Annesley when we resume services in the building. So, the time has come to look for a new way to record the services as they happen. The July 11<sup>th</sup> service will be the last one that we provide which has been pre-recorded. We will be converting to a live stream in preparation for returning to regular services. Please take time at the end of the July 11<sup>th</sup> service to view the lengthy list of people who have contributed to the production of the online services over the last 17 months. You will be amazed at how many people have been involved in this ministry. We will be taking a break for a couple of weeks while we figure out the equipment and skills that will be needed to do the live stream. We will provide links to other services during that time.

**The Annual General Meeting** will be held on Wednesday, July 14<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. **In order for us to safely prepare for the seating, we ask if you would kindly R.S.V.P. to 519-986-3019, so we can have an idea of the number of people who will be attending.** We will be using the meeting to test seating and traffic flow for eventual in-church services. **The Annual Report** is ready and digital copies have been sent out with the announcements for the last few weeks. Let us know if you want a paper copy, and one will be provided to you. *Copies are also available for download on Annesley's website*. Items that will be discussed are: how to honour David Fries' time at Annesley, and how the congregation is feeling about reopening now that most people have been vaccinated. Last year, a survey showed that very few people were comfortable with returning until the vaccine had been developed and distributed. Things will still be limited due to restrictions – sign-in at the door, no singing, no coffee hour, seating with household members only, but it will be one step toward getting back to "normal".





Thank you to all who organized, volunteered and /or supported the first ever **Harriston Packers Meat Sale Fundraiser**. Approximately 75 households received an order, along with their Chapman's Ice Cream coupon. **Over \$2,100 was raised in total**! Pickup day turned fine, so both volunteers and buyers were able to enjoy some overdue and safe visiting. As well, a good logistical foundation was laid for both this event and others like it in the future. This fundraiser was in lieu of our Pork Chop BBQ. We are giving some thought to another Harriston event later this year. So thank you again to everyone, and special thanks to Gracie and Kadyn Den Haan, our youngest volunteers, who brought with them their very own special sunshine.


Please don't forget the Annesley still has regular expenses during this time.

The Reopening Committee met this week. Now that Ontario is in Stage 2, we are allowed to have 25% of capacity in the Sanctuary for religious ceremonies, rites and services.

We will use the Annual Congregational Meeting on July 14<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. to test traffic flows, sign- in and distanced seating, in preparation for a safe opening for Sunday services in the near future.

One of the items on the agenda for the July14th Annual Congregational meeting will be a discussion to find out whether the congregation is gaining comfort in returning.

#### Search Committee

The Search Committee soldiers on in the midst of a very difficult time. It is a time at which Annesley finds itself at several forks in what has been a bumpy road. Chair Mark Worthington, Hazel Johnston and Pamela Newman have been committee members since June of 2018. They are very tired to say the least. Skating close to the edge of burnout. John Lewis is a new member this year and Wendy McCauley is attempting to join the team, all the while juggling three careers. If you would be willing to serve on this committee we would ask that you speak with Mark Worthington.

At this time, we wish to reiterate our thanks to retiring members Dale Beare, Mora Foster and Joanne Timmins, each of whom was compelled to leave for health-related issues. Their work is to be commended.

We wish to remind the congregation that this is fairly poor soil that we are attempting to till. Over fifty prospects have been contacted, with perhaps ten replies, none progressing to the interview stage. We at Annesley are witness to the fact that the "calling" to ministers these days is not what it once was. And last but not least, is the concern for potential housing in these parts.

We have met three times since the last Newsletter, and while as well as grappling with the challenges of the United Church Hub, have joined with the Worship Committee (also now depleted) on the task of keeping a preacher in the pulpit from Sunday to Sunday.

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We have only recently been in contact with a prospective hire that contacted us, but upon first contact does not seem enthused. We were disappointed, some time ago, when having arranged and begun an interview with what we believed to be an interesting candidate, it became clear that she was unaware that our posting was clearly one for 27 hours, not 40. Nevertheless, we had a cordial conversation and she shared some previously unknown aspects of the Church Hub.

In May, our Search Team attended a Zoom meeting on the subject of SME (Supervised Ministry Education). This was expedited by Kathy Underwood and advised by Diane Blanchard and Tanya Cameron, both of the United Church of Canada. This is a program by which a student minister is hired under contract and covenant, in lieu of an ordained minister. Depending on the school, this employment of either eight months or two years would take place either in the midst of their academics or at the conclusion of their studies. While the word "intern" springs to mind, it is not just about putting in time to gain experience, but an ongoing growth and education exercise as well. The candidate is supported by an LST (Lay Supervision Team) appointed by the Board of Elders. An Educational Supervisor, appointed by the United Church, meets regularly with the candidate and helps them to clarify goals, engage in shared reflection and focus learning skills in ministry. Hopefully, the relationship is mutually beneficial, and at the end of the term the candidate might determine to remain with the congregation on a permanent basis, through ordination, or alternately remain during completion of studies and subsequent ordination. While there are both advantages (travelling the path of learning with a minister in training, youthful and/or fresh leadership, and the prospect of a permanent hire) and disadvantages (that the candidate chooses to move on, or that during the student's contracted period, we miss the opportunity of hiring a fully qualified and experienced ordained minister.

At this time we see two obstacles:

-Our nemesis, namely lack of housing opportunities in Markdale.

-The challenge of forming an LST at this time.

However, within our church family may be a group of three or four individuals who are excited by this challenge. So if at this time you wish to delve more deeply into this alternative, please speak with any member of the Search Team.


